I. Title: Orphan Family Building – Summer Internship in Ghana

Description: Our aim is to build and restore families for orphans by utilizing the rise of internet and mobile connectivity in third world countries, the first of which will be Ghana. Our priority will be to facilitate the process of returning children to their extended families, which is Africa's traditional method of foster care. If reunifying families is not possible or preferable, the project will help the children get adopted within Africa by helping to develop the local foster care systems.

Orphan Family Building (O.F.B.) is currently recruiting for four to six interns to serve as the pilot team to Accra, Ghana this summer. For 4-6 weeks the interns will work very closely with national leaders in Ghana (who have already committed to our project) to charter the course of our involvement there. The interns will explore our role in orphanages to provide health care screening, interviews, document registration, and media recording of the children. The interns will also be involved in identifying the best way to compile the information on individual orphans into an online database that will be used to help the children reunify with lost family or find loving foster care locally. We are looking for people with great enthusiasm, creativity, and a consistent work ethic. Multimedia experience is desired and recommended, but not a requirement. Interns will be fully trained for the experience. If accepted, you will work closely with the OFB board team members and under the supervision of the Medical Student Director, Jennifer Miller, and Co-founder, Michael McCullough. We expect the pilot to grow into a large international service corps. Those selected will be on the founding team of a significant new non-profit organization.

Term: This position has an 8-week summer term, with 4-6 weeks in the field.

Supervisor: Students will work under the supervision of the Med. Student Director, Jennifer Miller, and Co-Founder, Michael McCullough.

Time Required: Successful candidate must be able to dedicate 8 full weeks of their summer to the program.

Requirements: Great enthusiasm, creativity, and a consistent work ethic. Multimedia experience recommended.

IV. **Title: Research Director, Santa Clara Valley Medical Center S.C.O.P.E. Research (SRT)**

***Full-time compensated summer position, if desired (part-time possible too)**

Description of Duties: S.C.O.P.E. is looking for an outstanding undergraduate interested in health care access issues for underserved patients to direct the 2008 SRT research project at Santa Clara Valley Medical Center focusing on improving access to care for patients who leave the emergency department before seeing a physician. <http://scope.beagooddoctor.org/program/srt07-08.html>. From 6/1/07 – 12/1/07 the SCOPE Research Team enrolled over 1000 patients in the SCVMC Emergency Department and conducted over 80 interviews. We are now in data entry & analysis phase with an end-date goal for publication of this fall 2008. The current director, Jennifer Miller, is a second-year medical student who would like to train an undergraduate to take the main lead in directorship of this project - someone with the time, attention to detail, motivation, and initiative to see this project through to completion. Jennifer would be available for approximately 3-5 hours per week of advisory work to help in this process. Job duties would entail leadership of a team of 10 members in a) quantitative data collection from the computerized charting system at the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center Emergency Department, b) transcription of 80 audio-taped telephone interviews, c) data analysis using NVivo (qualitative) & SPSS or a similar quantitative data analysis program, and d) write-up & presentation. Experience with data analysis is optimal, but not required for those who are willing to teach themselves efficiently. Conversational Spanish skills also optimal, but not required. Finished product will be presented by the Research Team Director and Jennifer Miller to the SCVMC ED Administration, and, it is hoped, at a national ED research convention, as well as submission for publication.

VI. **HEAL Internship (Health Education & Advocacy Liaisons) in Honduras – Fall Quarter Internship Available**

Description: Through one-month to three-month internships, student interns learn about pediatric medicine and public health first-hand by working alongside American and Honduran doctors, residents, medical students, nurses, and other health care workers on the island of Roatan, Honduras. Weekday mornings are dedicated to working in the Roatan Volunteer Pediatric Clinic (RVPC), an outpatient clinic located in the Roatan Public Hospital and run by Global Healing. After mornings in the clinic, RVPC interns schedule their afternoons to work with Global Healing staff and local community health workers on projects that address local needs at the time of the internship.

Description of Duties: The student intern serves as Clinic Coordinator, triaging patients, updating the patient database, locating resources (i.e. meds, specialty referrals, etc.) for patients, helping them through the logistics of utilizing these resources (i.e. locating funding for trips to the mainland for follow-up care), and notifying the volunteer physicians in the clinic about existing resources.

Supervisor: HEAL Co-Directors Erin Dizon, Stephanie Hwang, and Natalie Ramos; and the Global Healing directorship.

Compensation: None. Estimated average trip cost = \$2,000 for a one-month internship.
